The theme of the 2011-2012 Peace Poster contest is "Children Know Peace". Students ages 11, 12, or 13 on November 15th are eligible to participate.

Deadlines for the Peace Poster Contest are:

11/15/11 Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the District Governor.

12/1/11 Postmark deadline for the District Governor to send one winning poster to the Multiple District Chairperson.

12/15/11 Postmark deadline for Multiple District Chairperson to send one winning poster to Public Relations Department at Lions International Headquarters.

2/1/12 International winners will be notified on or before this date.

24 International finalists are selected each year. This represents the work of 350,000 young participants. Posters are shared globally via the internet, exhibits and the media around the world.

As we approach the 100th anniversary of our organization in 2017, Lions are looking to highlight this milestone. The Sandy Spring Lions Club in Maryland proposed a commemorative U.S. Mint silver dollar as a way to celebrate our centennial. With the sponsorship of Representative Peter Roskam of Illinois, we are one step closer to making the coin a reality after the introduction of the "Lions Clubs International Century of Service Commemorative Coin Act" or [HR 2139](#).

Passage of the legislation depends on accruing 290 House sponsors and 67 Senate sponsors in order to send HR 2139 to the President for his signature into law. **We need your help** to achieve President Scruggs' goal to confirm 150 co-sponsors by international convention this July!

1. Call/write your U.S. Senators and Representative and ask him/her to co-sponsor HR 2139.
2. Urge Lions in your districts and clubs to call/write their U.S. Senators and Representatives to co-sponsor 2139.

(Code is not case sensitive)

Beep Baseball is baseball for the visually impaired. There is a sighted pitcher tossing a beeping ball to a batter ready to swing for the fences. Once the batter has made contact with the ball, a sighted person will set off a beep that will be at either 1st or 3rd base. The batter must listen and find their way to the base before the fielder fields the ball. In the field a sighted person will call out a fielders name and the fielder must listen to the beep to find the ball. If the fielder finds the ball before the batter reaches the base it is considered an out. If the batter reaches the base first then the team scores a run.

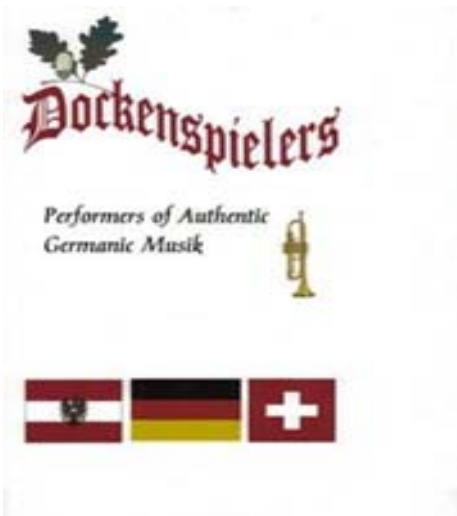

FUNCTION ATTENDANCE

- Attendance at any of the functions may be any Lion or Lioness
- Club officers are not specified
- Any Lion or Lioness attending function must make Secretary aware for reporting purposes

COMMUNITY SERVICE

- Points awarded for each event based on number of days, example if White Cane runs two days = 600 points
- Sponsorship of youth groups – 400 points for each team, troop or group
- Peace Poster and/or Drug Awareness Contest – 400 points each

FINANCIAL

- Should be self-explanatory – Example of a District Project that is not a DG Project may be Youth Exchange or Lions Quest

PUBLIC RELATIONS

- Encouragement for a club to prepare a tri-fold club brochure
- Newspaper articles should be about service projects or other activities of the club within the community

RECYCLING PROJECTS

- Each Secretary must report the number of eyeglasses, hearing aids or cell phones either monthly or after turning in at Cabinet meeting – it is not the eyeglass or hearing chair's duty to report – club report

MISCELLANEOUS

- WMMR date change to 15th of month
- Central Penn Blood Bank – each unit donated = 300 points

sound as it is pitched to a batter or is hit to the field. Players are either blind or wear blindfolds so that everyone except the pitcher and catcher play without the advantage of sight. Spectators were very impressed to learn that being blind does not mean an inability to perform. They learned the many roles that Lions play in support of sight preservation and that the ForSight Vision Center provides many services such as eye screening and reading assistance tools that help improve the lives of sight impaired people. The game was filmed by a local TV station, WPMT Fox43, and aired that

night multiple times.

So what’s the story? The story is a familiar one, where a Lions Club steps up to help their local community in small and big ways. The Jacobus Lions membership provided many hours to make this July 4th Community Event a great success and continue a long-standing community activity. The Jacobus Lions Club thanks the ForSight Vision Center for joining with us in “Beep Baseball” to show the communities that being limited in sight does not limit the sight impaired in being a part of our communities. We also thank the communities of Jacobus, Loganville and Springfield Township and beyond for their great support for this year’s Jacobus 4th of July “BLAST” and we look forward to seeing you in 2012.
