2011-2012 PROJECTS FUNDED BY THE PA LIONS HEARING RESEARCH FOUNDATION

GA - 3102; "Behavioral Readout of Motor Preparation for Orienting Movements to Auditory Stimuli" -- Neeraj I. Gandhi, Ph.D.-University of Pittsburgh-\$ 15,000
This proposal seeks to enhance the understanding of the reflex pathways related to eye movements. The investigators have determined that initiating eye movements with a blink response from a puff of air enhances the speed of the visual reflex. They will use an auditory stimulus instead of the puff of air for the blink reflex to enhance the understanding of the auditory-ocular reflex pathway and how it can be modified.

GA -- 3103; "Temporal Precision of Information Transmitted by the Auditory Nerve" - Thomas D. Parsons, VMD/Ph.D. - University of Pennsylvania, School of Veterinary Medicine -- \$20,000
The inner ear sends electrical signals to the brain in the form of precise neural discharges carried by the auditory nerve, which underlies the ability to localize sounds, determine pitch, and discriminate sound levels. The investigators propose to measure the timing of auditory nerve discharges in chicks responding to conspecific vocalization and to determine how much precision is needed to transmit maximal information. It is hoped that this will assist in developing better coding strategies for cochlear implants.

GA - 3104; "Evaluation of Vibrotactile Balance Prosthesis in Patients with Vestibular Impairment"-Patrick Loughlin, Ph.D.-University of Pittsburgh-\$18,837
This is a study to evaluate the efficacy of a recently developed vibrotactile balance device for improving balance function in adults with a balance impairment. If this proves to be an effective means for patients to understand their posture and sway, it may greatly facilitate their rehabilitation.

GA - 3105; "Neural Mechanisms of Encoding of Complex Natural Sounds"-
Maria N. Geffen, Ph.D. - University of Pennsylvania, School of Medicine-\$15,000
The aim of this study is to develop a functional model of how the brain differentiates complex sounds like different musical pieces, rustle of leaves, or a brook gurgling. This information is extremely important for the future of cochlear implant coding strategies or future hearing aid programs.

WHAT IS WHITE CANE DAY?



The purpose of White Cane Day is to solicit and obtain funds from the public by voluntary contributions to be used expressly for the treatment and prevention of blindness. Such funds therefore are to be collected and in turn contributed to be used for projects and such activities as are closely associated with the blind.



HISTORY

In 1921, James Biggs, a photographer from Bristol, England, became blind following an accident. Because he was feeling uncomfortable with the amount of traffic around his home, he painted his walking stick white to be more easily visible.

In 1930, the late George A. Bonham, President of the Peoria Lions Club (Illinois) introduced the idea of using the white cane with a red band as a means of assisting the blind in independent mobility. The Peoria Lions approved the idea, white canes were made and distributed, and the Peoria City Council adopted an ordinance giving the bearers the right-of-way to cross the street. News of the club's activity spread quickly to other Lions clubs throughout the United States, and their visually handicapped friends experimented with the white canes. Overwhelming acceptance of the white cane idea by the blind and sighted alike quickly gave cane users a unique method of identifying their special need for travel consideration among their sighted counterparts.

Also in 1931, in France, Guilly d'Herbemont recognized the danger to blind people in traffic and launched a national "white stick movement" for blind people. She donated 5,000 white canes to people in Paris.

Today white cane laws are on the books of every state in the US and many other countries, providing blind persons a legal status in traffic. The white cane now universally acknowledges that the bearer is blind. For specific information contact your local government office for motor vehicles.

WHITE CANE SAFETY DAYS

To make the American people more fully aware of the meaning of the white cane and of the need for motorists to exercise special care for the blind person who carries it, on October 6, 1964, the U.S. Congress approved a resolution authorizing the President of the US to annually issue a proclamation **designating October 15th as "National White Cane Safety Day."** *

The National Federation of the Blind (NFB), a leading organization for the blind, has established the **third week in May as "White Cane Week."** * During this week, a special concentration of efforts to educate the public concerning the hopes and aspirations of the blind is emphasized.

In keeping with the Lions' established tradition of assisting the blind, your Lions club can do much to promote community awareness of the white cane law by seeing that all driver education manuals prominently include the law. Request that local radio, TV and newspaper media periodically feature news of the law's existence and its wording in detail. Contact offices of local government officials to request a proclamation.

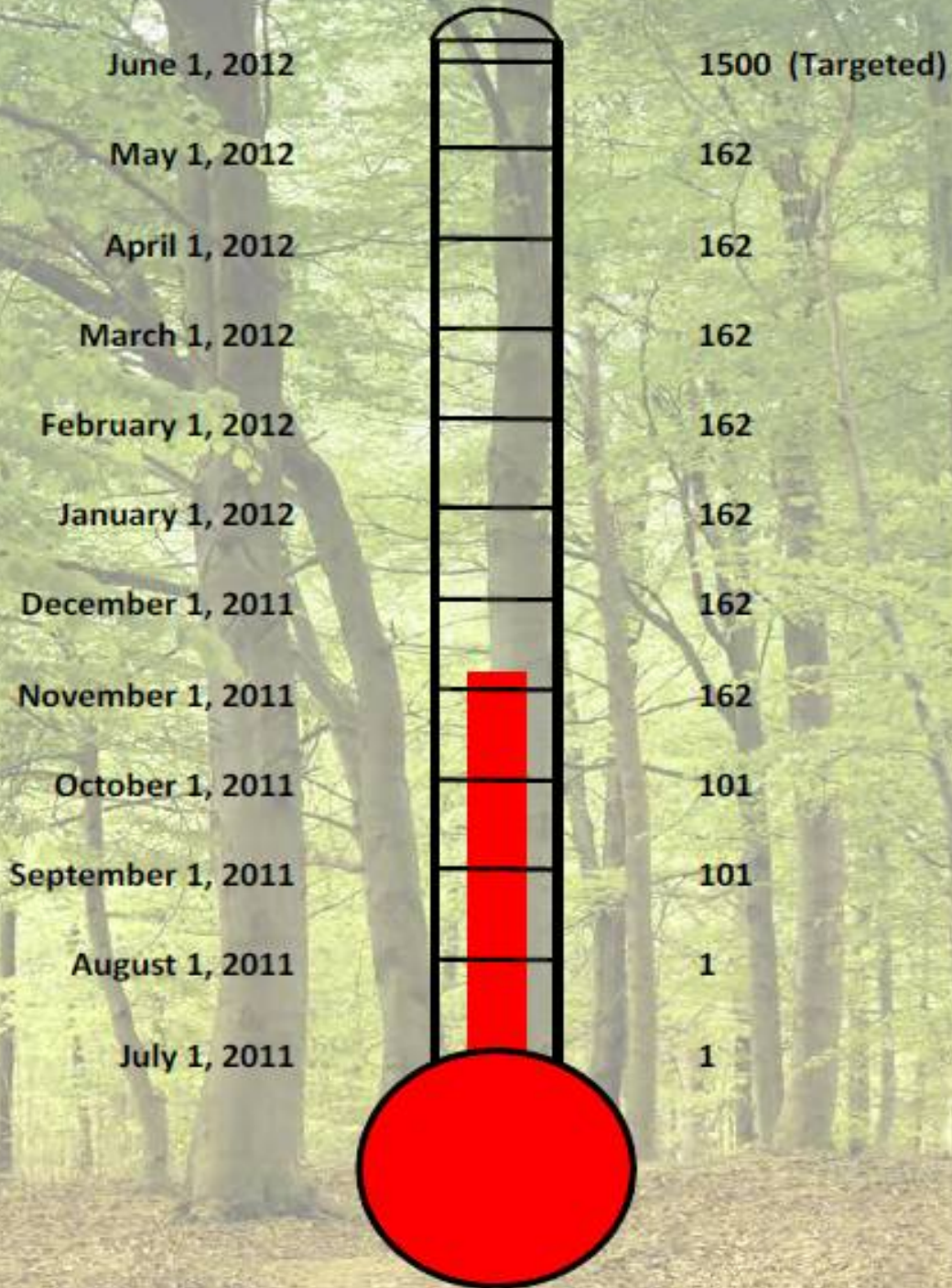

SHIPPENSBURG LIONS & SCOUT PACK 251 PARTNER TO PLANT TREES

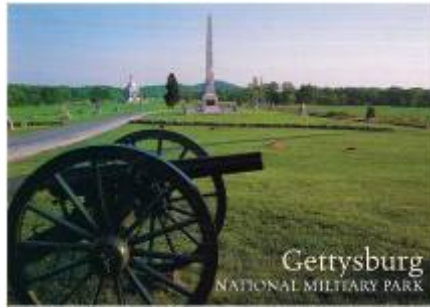
